Biosolids Management Committee

For the first time in decades, EPA is busy with biosolids. With a biosolids-specific Scientific Advisory Board (SAB) pouring over EPA's proposed framework for assessing risk and a new screening tool that enables users to sift through hundreds of chemicals and determine whether a deeper review is warranted, the current way of doing things on the biosolids front is likely to change. The Biosolids Management Committee will discuss how clean water utilities can be most informed and ready for the looming regulatory trade winds ahead that could shake up how biosolids are managed.
